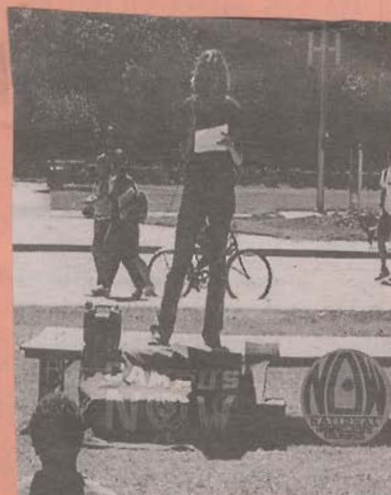

Many countries around the Mediterranean serve olives before a meal is served — this is especially so on Sundays or during major dinner times.

Here is a quick olive recipe that can be made within four minutes.

For the grocery list:

1. Kalamata olives, with pits
2. garlic cloves, minced
3. olive oil, extra virgin is preferred
4. 1 lemon, just a bit of lemon zest.
5. any herb that you like — basil, oregano, or rosemary.

Directions:

1. Put a frying pan on the stovetop on one dial above low (1 or 2)
2. drain the olives from any liquid and put them in the pan along with the other ingredients.
3. Wait 2-3 minutes for the ingredients to blend and then transfer the contents of the pan to a serving bowl or plate!

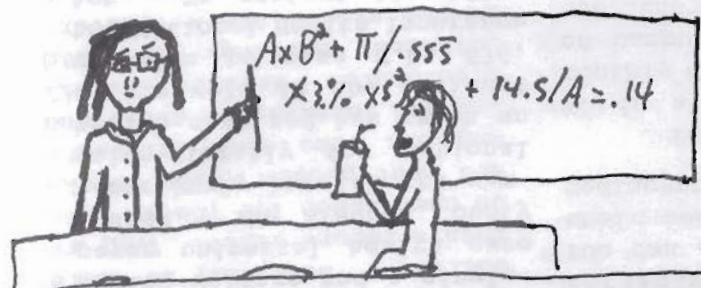

a pocket (2), another flap (3),
and another pocket (4). Fold
3 into 2, then fold 1 over
2 and 3 and into 4. Do the
same to the other end.

• CONSTRUCTING A WALLET FROM SCRAP MATERIALS.

You will need: Scrap vinyl
(or paper), scissors, and an
Xacto knife.

STEP 1 → Neatly fold an 8.5" x 11"
sheet (paper or vinyl) in half.
Next, open it and fold each
side into the middle so that it
is split into 4 sections.

STEP 2 → Now fold the paper
in half, perpendicular to the
other folds and press the
edges to make creases, then
unfold it completely.

Your page should look like
this:



STEP 3 → cut along the dotted
lines only.

STEP 4 → Fold the 2nd and 4th
flaps (from the top) in towards
you on either side. If using
vinyl, remove the backing with

Ongoing exhibits at the Harn include highlights from the African and Asian collections.

3. Downtown Plaza concert series
